
Please check your children for head lice. We have had a couple of cases over the past week. Should you require shampoo to treat head lice then please phone the office and we will send some home.

Ruma Tupu:

Term four is moving fast in Tupu Tuakana with a new mathematics focus on symbols and expressions. We will look closely at what these symbols mean: $<$ $>$ $=$ $+$ $-$ x \div and the relationships between them. We will be using activities such as building mats with coloured plastic Cuisenaire rods, to show that the equal sign “=” says that the numbers on either side of it are the same.

Here is an example of a 12 mat. (The white rod = 1, the red = 2, the green = 3, the pink = 4 and so on.) Each line of colours = 12. Looking at the green and pink rows, this shows $3 + 3 + 3 + 3 = 4 + 4 + 4$. This can be read as $3 + 3 + 3 + 3$ is the same as $4 + 4 + 4$. Talk with your child about what other equations can be written using the 12 mat.



Puawai:

Welcome to week 4. It feels as though we are zooming through the term. This week we are completing our Novel Quests, we are looking at imagery and personification in writing and are moving onto looking at mathematical symbols. Below are some of the similes and metaphors (with their explanations) the students created last week.

Simile	Metaphor
Charlamaine I am as quiet as a Robber . (I am very stealthy).	My Sister is the Devil . (My sister is evil).
Braidon He is as soft as a Marshmallow. (I don't mean he is a Marshmallow he is just chubby).	My dad is a brave lion. (My dad loves to protect his family).
Emma She is as sour as a lime. (She is mean).	She is a cheetah. (She is fast).
Marama Your teeth are as healthy as toothpaste. (You have good teeth).	He is a wolf attacking his cub. (He is abusive)
Moana Your mum is as sweet as sugar. (Your mum is kind).	She is a twig. (She is skinny).
Tyler The calm lake is like a mirror. (The lake is reflecting and not raging).	The resting snow is a white blanket. (The snow has covered the mountain).
Mauri I am as fast as a Cheetah. (I am a fast runner).	His head is the size of an elephant's. (His head is big).
Waiariki She was as sly as a fox. (She was sneaky).	He is hungrier than a pig. (He loves food).
Hinerangi She is like a fluffy marshmallow. (She is very chubby).	He is a pig. (He is untidy)
Payton His nose is like Pinocchio's. (He has a long nose)	
Damian My dad is as strong as a gorilla. (My dad has big muscles and can lift anything).	He is the moon. (He is shiny and bright).
